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Snowman Park

On November 22, 1983, an 18 foot, 5 inch snowman took permanent residence in Kenaston. Originally the snowman signified our community being the Blizzard Capital of Saskatchewan, but now it represents our hockey spirit and has become the community mascot.

At the unveiling of the Snowman, Provincial dignitaries, community Mayor, Chamber President were present along with Scrooge, Old Man Winter and the Abominable Snowman.





Water Tower

The C.N.R reached the remote location called Bonnington in 1889. The first water tower was built near the spring just south of Bonnington, Assiniboia, NWT which is what this area was then called. In late 1905, when Saskatchewan became a province, the name was changed to Kenaston. In 1910, the new (and existing) 40,000 gallon water tower was built by CNR. This tower was constructed with tapered sides. Put in historical context there were 400 water towers originally constructed in Saskatchewan. As of 2009 there are only five remaining water towers in the province, of which only three are on their original sites. The Kenaston Water Tower is the oldest of the 5 remaining towers and is the only remaining 'tapered' tower, which gives it both historical and architectural significance. The water tower was restored to its present state in 2014 as a Chamber of Commerce tourism project.



We are pleased to have our three grain elevators still adorning the skyline, which are now privately owned and developed into business ventures.

(Nearest Elevator) In 1960 the Wheat Pool built a new steel elevator; this was Western Canada's first all steel grain elevator at 111 feet with a 60,000 bushel capacity. This was one of three steel elevators built in Saskatchewan.

(Middle Elevator) The Federal Grain Company had built a new elevator next to the Pool in 1965, and was later bought by Wheat Pool.

(Far Elevator) The United Grain Growers constructed and opened a new elevator in 1973, which towered over the other elevators, as it had an 82 foot crib wall and was 118 feet overall in height.
